The notice was related to the planned payments to asset owners for minor damage to assets (generally crops or fruit trees) impacted by current project activities such as road maintenance and eligible for compensation. The notice was intended to advise the owners that payments were scheduled to take place at the time and place mentioned. It is part of the standard protocol that the Company undertakes when compensating owners for minor damages prior to resettlement. It should be noted that the payments are calculated in accordance with standard Government rates for productive assets. Unfortunately, there have been occasions when the date and/or time for payments has changed due to unavoidable circumstances which appears to have happened in this case. In respect to the individual raising the question about damages, our records show that compensation was paid to him in Phase 14 which followed the

The resettlement compensation process still has to be agreed with communities and Government. The full compensation process will be included in a Resettlement Plan that will have to be approved by the Government. After this approval each household that will lose assets will receive an agreement that will tell each household exactly what assets will be lost due to the development of the Project and how much compensation the household is due to receive. This agreement has to be then formally accepted by the affected household before compensation can be delivered. It is important to note that households will not only receive compensation, but will also be able to participate in various Project livelihood improvement programs.</p>

The negotiation is intended to comply with the legal basis but it also requires an agreement between the government, the community and the company. Our task is to verify that the process complies with the established standards. There must be an individual and group agreement on the compensation before we authorize the next public consultation.

Another aspect has to do with the consultation process, it is a legal right, and especially the process of involving people in the decisions to be taken. Thus, we suggest that people be prepared before the meetings. People need to know before the meeting about what will be discussed so they can prepare relevant issues to raise at the meeting. People have to know that the consultation is a time for negotiation. Thus, people must come to the meetings prepared - the government and the communities.
